#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 NOVEMBER 2023

#### NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas) 1964 and the members. The Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the committee have determined appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. The accounting policies that have been adopted in the preparation of the statements are as follows:

#### (a) Revenue and Other Income

Membership subscriptions and replacement cards are recognised on an accrual basis when the Association is entitled to it. All other income is recognised when received.

All revenue is stated exclusive of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

#### (b) Expenses

Expenses are made up mainly from film and cinema hire expenses and are recognised when cash is paid.

All expenses is stated exclusive of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

#### (c) Income Tax

The activities of the Association are exempt from income tax in accordance with section 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### (d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and deposits held at call with banks.

### (e) Plant and Equipment

Each class of plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation or impairment.

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over the asset's useful life to the association, commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

# Report on the Financial Report Opinion

I have audited the financial report of Launceston Film Society Incorporated (the association), which comprises the Statement of Financial Position as at 30 November 2023, the Statement of Profit and Loss and Other Comprehensive Income for the year then ended and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the certification by the members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

In my opinion, the financial report of Launceston Film Society Incorporated presents fairly, in all material respects the financial position of Launceston Film Society Incorporated as of 30 November 2023 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements.

## **Basis for Opinion**

I conducted my audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report* section of my report. I am independent of the association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110: *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (the Code) that are relevant to my audit of the financial report in Australia. I have also fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

#### **Emphasis of Matter – Basis of Accounting**

I draw attention to Note 1 of the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the association to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas) 1964. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. My opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

### Responsibility of the Committee for the Financial Report

The committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Tas) 1964 and for such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud of error.

## Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but it is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.
